FROM THE PASTOR ---- REV. NATHANIEL ASPERGER

Greetings to you all in the name of our Lord, Jesus Christ!

It is always strange to me how fast time flies by. We are here in November 2025! One of the interesting things to me is how much can happen in a year; this year has felt exceptionally full. As we look at where we have been and look to the future, I want to be transparent with you all. We spent all of October talking about Stewardship, and we looked at it from a broader lens than simply finances. However, as I mentioned in the final week of the series, finances are a rather important thing. I will not rehash all the points we looked at in the series, but I do want you to consider a few additional things. Any organization in the world is a few years from thriving, and a few years from closing its doors. Even giant organizations that have a long history, like Joann Fabrics, Tupperware, and Red Lobster, have all gone bankrupt this year. In 2024, somewhere between 4,000 and 10,000 churches closed. I do not say this to scare anyone, as much as to point to the elephant in the room, financial well-being is a very important aspect of a place staying around.

Countryside has a long history here at 4690 Weiss Rd. Many of us have a long history integrated into Countryside's history. I believe that in my short time here, I have observed a lot of life in this place. You all, the living expression of this place, are an active people. You all choose to support more missions a year than some churches support in a couple of years. We have a fellowship every Sunday, which some churches 10x our size, wish they had. The Session is full of Elders seeking to respond to a world of chaos with proactive care and love. The Deacons are active, seeking to meet people where they are and grow in fellowship. You all greet each other with excitement every time we are together. There is a love that is tangible in this place. We are a vibrant church seeking to be all the more vibrant. When I first came to meet the Pastoral Nominating Committee, I felt my soul leap with excitement in this place. There is life, there is hope and there is fellowship in this place.

However, we do have a financial concern. I am not writing all this to you to give you guilt or tell you that you are failing this place. Those things would be dishonest. I believe we have so much good we are doing, and so much good we can do coming down the line. There are so many opportunities for good in and around Countryside Trinity Church. I would ask of us all to think of two things.

- 1. What ideas do you have to increase our income? Remember, we are not a business, and we are not in the world to make the Temple into a den for business. We do have expenses we need to cover, however. What things, programs etc., have you seen at other churches, or what ideas do you have to try to increase our income? I am a part-time pastor, and I can reasonably only do so much in a week. We have a beautiful building and many wonderful people with skills, talents, and ideas. I would welcome ideas for the Session and Committees of our church to research and reflect on.
- 2. I ask us all to consider what it is that we steward that we can use to honor God and grow this community of faith. Andrea and I regularly sit and evaluate our finances, as well as the things we have and our abilities to act in the world. From that, sometimes we come to the reality that we can do more with what we have. It sometimes makes things a little tricky; schedules and budgets need to be adjusted. The benefit of honoring God with what we have, I have never regretted in my life. What do we steward that we can give more fully to God?

I invite us to all consider these things and talk about them. Emphasis on talk about them, seriously, come talk to me and the Elders of the church! The thing with the elephants in the room is that either we can treat them as invisible until it's too late, or we speak very loudly about them often until they go away. One of the problems in our culture is that issues are often ignored until it is too late. My prayer and my hope for Countryside is that in a few years, we will all be overjoyed with where we have come from. We can celebrate the ways we responded to the Spirit for this time and place. I pray that we thrive, and that the community grows inside and around Countryside Trinity Church, at 4690 Weiss Rd in Saginaw.

May the Lord bless you and keep you until we meet again.

Personnel: Job Descriptions have been updated and should be ready for the November Session meeting for approval. CTC is need of a treasurer. It must be a member of CTC. Mari McKenzie is the current treasure. She has notified CTC that she is planning to transfer her membership to a church in California where she is living.

Spiritual Life: Advent begins November 30. Advent programs will take place on Nov. 30, Dec. 7, Dec. 14, and Dec. 21. Soup and bread meals will take place on Nov. 30 and Dec. 7. Hanging of the Greens will be on Nov. 23 before and after church.

Nominating: Sandy Redfield and Ron Platt are looking for members to fill the Session and Deacons.

Pastor: Pastor Nathaniel will be on vacation during the week of Oct. 14-16, working on his studies.

New Business: Locking Doors- Doors are kept locked during the week unless people are expected. Questions have been raised about locking the door during church services. CTC will check with our insurance company for guidance. Bethany will research policies about locking church doors.

Scouts: There will be an Eagle Ceremony for 2 scouts from the troop at CTC on November 23, 2025, at 3:00 P.M. with a reception to follow. All are invited to attend.

Adjournment: Meeting adjourned with prayer from Pastor Nathaniel at 1:50 P.M. Next Session meeting Nov. 16, following church.
