FROM THE PASTOR ---- REV. NATHANIEL ASPERGER

Greetings to you all in the name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ!

We are here in the last month of 2025, and with it has come Advent. The word Advent means "the arrival of a notable person, thing or event". For Christians, the Advent season is not only an event, it is also the celebration of the arrival of a very important person. Advent is the first season of the Christian year. The Christian calendar starts with Advent and ends with the feast of Christ the King. This season is a special time for Christians. There is the obvious point that Christmas is the start of Jesus' physical presence in the world. Advent becomes a period of time to build up to the entrance of Jesus on Christmas. For most of us, this is not our first Advent. I would, however, like to challenge you to look at this season like a new experience. Consider what it really means to start this new year of your Christian faith. For you, consider what is so special about Advent.

During Advent, we have the opportunity to look at what we understand of the bible as a whole. History is one of the most important things to understand how we got where we are today. It might not surprise you, but I am rather passionate about the Bible. It is, in general, one of the most important things in my world. I also believe that it is one of the most misunderstood documents in the world. There have been many people who have used the bible for their own selfish goals. We can think of people who mistranslated the bible to support their own viewpoint. The King James translation has some very specific edits around worldly authority, for instance. Sometimes it is simply ignorance that leads to misunderstandings about the Word of God. The history of the Word of God, from being written to being available in print and app form today, is a long, tumultuous history.

Why bring this up? The reality is that we can always learn more about the bible. Even if we do not think we need to know more, there are always ways to better understand our faith. As we look towards Advent, as we look down the snowy path towards Christmas, what are we excited to know better? Is it the history of the Messiah in the First Testament? Is it better to understand how Alexander the Great shaped the world Jesus was born into? There is always more to learn, understand and reflect on from the Word of God.

As we continue towards Christmas, may the Lord bless you and keep you, may the Lord make their face to shine upon you, and bring you peace.

Nominating: Pastor Nathaniel reported for Sandy Redfield who was absent.

Carol Van Arsdale will take Darren's Session position. All other positions will be filled by current members who have agreed to serve again.

Pastor: Pastor Nathaniel needs to have hip replacement surgery. He hopes to have it done after the Congregational Meeting in January.

New Business: Carol will remind scouts to check all doors, including doors that were not expected to be used during the event/meeting. Kathy will make signs for doors directing users to lock, close and then try to open the door again to be sure it is locked.

M/S/C by Kathy Loviska and seconded by Bethany Scovill to lock all church doors 15 minutes into the church service (10:45 regular Sunday services, 4:45 for special services). Call the church if you are going to be later than that time. Kathy will put this information on the slides and announcements. It will be published in the newsletter. A sign will be placed on the inside of the door reminding users of this new policy. The policy will take effect next Sunday. The church cell phone will be given to the ushers during the service in case anyone calls to get in.

CHRISTIAN OUTREACH: In the past couple of Newsletters, we have listed most of the Missions we support throughout the year. With what we have already listed and that which was collected in the last couple of weeks, I believe we have given more than \$7,000 this year. All of us at Countryside Trinity Church should be extremely proud of how we take care of God's children. We are not a large congregation, but we definitely are a giving one! Thank you to all who have given to our many missions that we support throughout the year. You are truly special!

PER CAPITA: The Presbytery of Lake Huron has recently set the Per Capita amount for 2026 at \$35.00. Below is a description of what Per Capita means.



WHAT IS PER CAPITA?

Fair question. Let's attempt to answer it.

PER CAPITA has been part of our funding history for over 150 years. When presbyteries, synods, and the General Assembly meet, they are conducting the legislative and judicial business of the church and incur necessary expenses. There are also some necessary administrative expenses involved which enable these ecclesiastical, legislative, and judicial functions to be performed. Historically, per capita has been used to fund these. Importantly, per capita funding enables governing councils to make decisions regarding distribution of mission dollars without itself being funded by those same dollars.

PER CAPITA, CONTINUED: The whole church shares in these expenses since everyone who is a member shares in the benefits of this system of church government. Per capita provides for the financial participation of all local churches as part of a connectional and representative church, thus providing for unity and mutual responsibility within the church.

HOW IS PER CAPITA COMPUTED?

The Per Capita Apportionment in the Presbytery of Lake Huron is based on a portion of certain salaries and expenses which are part of the operating expenses of the Presbytery.

Per Capita is the cost of being a Presbyterian, and if each member pays the per capita amount above his/her pledge or regular giving, pressure on the local budget is reduced.

Paying per capita is similar to:

- contributing one's dish to a potluck meal
- paying to be connected to the internet
- paying for the benefit of utilities, such as electricity, gas, water
- pitching in with others to pay for gasoline on a road trip

In order to keep presbytery's per capita rate from escalating the per capita portion of the budget is subsidized with a distribution from Presbytery's investments.

WHERE DO OUR PER CAPITA DOLLARS GO?

The amount that is set for per capita apportionment is a calculation based on the number of church members and the budget established annually by each governing body. At the presbytery level per capita pays for a number of items including:

- the mortgage payment on the presbytery office
- the office of the Stated Clerk including his salary and that of the Recording Clerk
- salaries of the Financial Secretary, Treasurer and the Administrative Assistant
- insurance coverage, legal counsel, annual audit
- costs associated with operating the presbytery office
- meeting costs for our standing units
